The RRDCs are doing their part to build strong communities in rural America by:

- Mobilizing multistate research teams to focus on critical regional and national rural development issues.
- Investing in promising social sciences research and outreach education programs.
- Organizing timely workshops and conferences on current and emerging rural development topics.
- Spearheading the development of needed educational curricula/resources.
- Expanding, through the delivery of in-depth training, the pool of land-grant and nonland-grant educators involved in rural development activities.
- Networking with public and private sector organizations that are committed to the well-being of rural Americans.
- Publishing newsletters, reports and policy briefs on important rural development topics.

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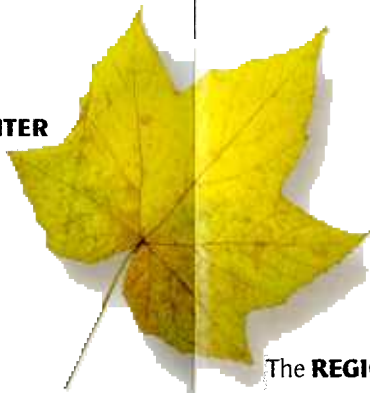
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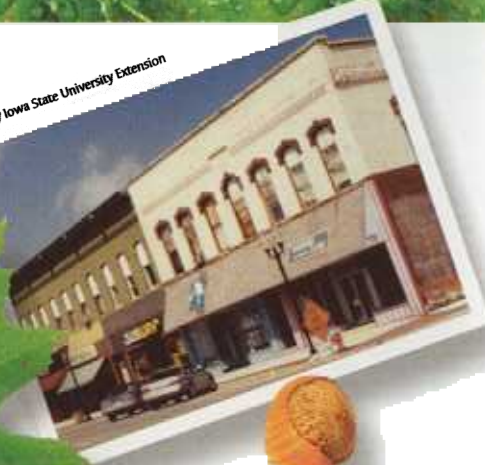
