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DR. STEVEN TURNER RETIRES AFTER 18 YEARS OF SERVICE TO MS STATE AND SRDC

DR. JOHN J. GREEN NAMED AS NEW DIRECTOR OF THE SRDC



Dr. Steve Turner has retired from Mississippi State University (MS State) and the Southern Rural Development Center (SRDC) after 18 years of combined service.

Turner began his service to Mississippi State University as Department Head and Professor of Agricultural Economics in 2003. In 2014, he transitioned to Director of the SRDC.

Dr. Turner's areas of research interests are

concentrated on marketing and finance with emphasis on the green and livestock sectors with futures and option markets. His research emphasis as director of SRDC was community and rural development.

Dr. Turner has received many prestigious awards during his career, such as the American Agricultural Economics Association Distinguished Teaching Award in 1992, the University of Georgia Richard B. Russell Outstanding Undergraduate Teaching Award in 1993, the 1996 Distinguished Professional Contribution in the Teaching of a Course Award from the Southern Agricultural Economics Association (SAEA), and in 2011, Dr. Turner received the Lifetime Achievement Award from the SAEA. His most recent bestowment has been the title of Professor Emeritus from the Department of Agricultural Economics at Mississippi State University.



Dr. John J. Green became Director of the Southern Rural Development Center (SRDC) on Aug. 1, 2021.

He is a Professor of in the Department of Agricultural Economics and comes to the SRDC with experience as senior research associate with the Center for Population Studies at the University of Mississippi (UM). Previously, he was director of this center and the State Data Center of Mississippi at UM

Dr. Green has worked primarily in Mississippi and the South, but his career has also reached internationally. His background includes policy development, community-based research, rural sociology and community development, and socioeconomic vulnerability and resilience.

Dr. Green earned bachelor's and master's degrees in political science and sociology at MS State before earning his doctorate in rural sociology at the University of Missouri-Columbia. He was the program scholar with the Mississippi Humanities Council and the Museum on Main Street Smithsonian Institute's traveling exhibit, Crossroads: Change in Rural America.

Previously, he was a faculty member at Delta State University, and he has authored numerous publications on topics including rural demography, community development, health, agrifood systems, and the challenges faced by communities experiencing shocks and stressors in the ever changing world.

COMING TOGETHER FOR RACIAL UNDERSTANDING



Coming Together for Racial Understanding has now been underway for over 3 years with many thanks to the Extension Committee on Organization and Policy for launching this important work. To date, three train-the-trainer events have been conducted with a total of 29 states participating. Each state team first works to expand the pool of trained Extension professionals - believing in the importance of doing our own work - before launching community dialogues.

Coming Together received the 2021 National Diversity in Extension Award at the annual Food and Agriculture Excellence Awards, hosted by the Association of Public and Land-Grant Universities. The award, sponsored by the USDA National Institute of Food and Agriculture and Cooperative Extension, recognizes significant contributions and accomplishments in achieving and sustaining diversity. CELEBRATING RETAIL, ACCOMMODATIONS, TOURISM AND ENTERTAINMENT BRIDGES BY BUILDING RURAL INNOVATIONS AND DEVELOPING GROWTH ECONOMIES

CREATE BRIDGES is an economic development initiative for rural, multi-county regions to strengthen businesses and workforce within the retail, accommodations, tourism and entertainment sectors. Below are examples of strategies implemented.



Workforce

Developed online workforce trainings tailored to the needs of their regions.



Tourism

Launched regional promotion campaigns based on their regions' needs - that included food tour videos, branding campaigns, shop local brochures, and tourism maps.

Business

Supported businesses pivoting in response to a changing business landscape, which included a consumer survey, a podcast series, resources for online marketing and sales, and a customer courtesy campaign.



Community Support

Provided resources to shore up broader support for the community. Strategies included: a stimulus fund partnership, training for rural chambers, micro-grants for community projects, regional story-mapping, and the 2021 Solar Eclipse planning.

The findings from the CREATE BRIDGES assessment provided area leadership the data needed to best fit our individual counties in the Ozark Foothills region.







Population aging is occurring more rapidly in rural than urban areas, pointing to both opportunities and important challenges that need attention from researchers to inform outreach, Extension, and policy. Recognizing that rural communities are not all the same, appreciation of diverse experiences and trajectories is critical.

The Southern Rural Development Center is part of the Interdisciplinary Network on Rural Population Health and Aging leadership team, along with researchers at The Pennsylvania State University, Syracuse University, and University of Colorado Boulder. With funding from the National Institute on Aging (NIA), the network facilitates innovative research on health and

aging trends among different rural populations and regions in the United States. With a distribution list of more than 225 researchers, nearly 40 core members, and an active advisory board, the national network is growing.

2021 BONNIE TEATER AWARD RECIPIENT: SREEDHAR UPENDRAM




Dr. Sreedhar Upendram, the 2021 recipient, is an Assistant Professor and Extension Specialist in the Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics at The University of Tennessee at Knoxville. Dr. Upendram's tenure in Extension community research development began in 2017.

Since then he has spearheaded many impactful efforts primarily focused on broadband access and adoption as well as rural water infrastructure. His broadband work resulted in the development and expansion of a library mobile internet hot-spot lending initiative adopted in six Tennessee counties and eleven elementary schools. He also secured funding to support a downtown Wi-Fi program to help improve economic development and entrepreneurial activity. Dr. Upendram's efforts supporting

rural water infrastructure have yielded substantial, positive impacts for the community through his development of a comprehensive database called "Ability to Pay Index". This tool has fundamentally changed the way that the state of Tennessee identifies and addresses small and disadvantaged communities who need critical help with water infrastructure.

In conjunction with these impacts, Dr. Upendram's academic scholarship has resulted in over nine peer-reviewed journal articles and over 111 peer-reviewed Extension publications exploring state and regional economic development challenges. Additionally he has secured over 20 research grants totaling over \$8.6 million. The aforementioned shows that Dr. Upendram continues to demonstrate the spirit of this prestigious award through his work in community development.
