E-Government



E-government is the term used for making government information and services available to the public via the internet.

Identifying Legitimate Information

Official U.S. government websites have two key features:

- .gov websites belong to official U.S. government organizations
- A lock symbol or https:// (note the "s") indicates secure websites

Three Common Search Areas

It is common to search for government resources according to the levels of government – local, state, and federal:

- Local is the most variable in terms of what is available
 - ✓ A good starting place is <u>https://www.usa.gov</u>, then click on "About the U.S. and its government"
- Federal and state resources
