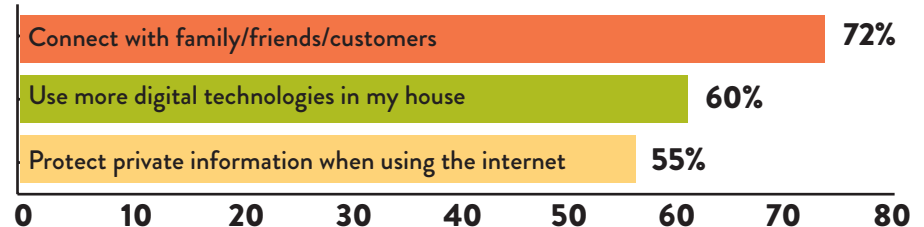

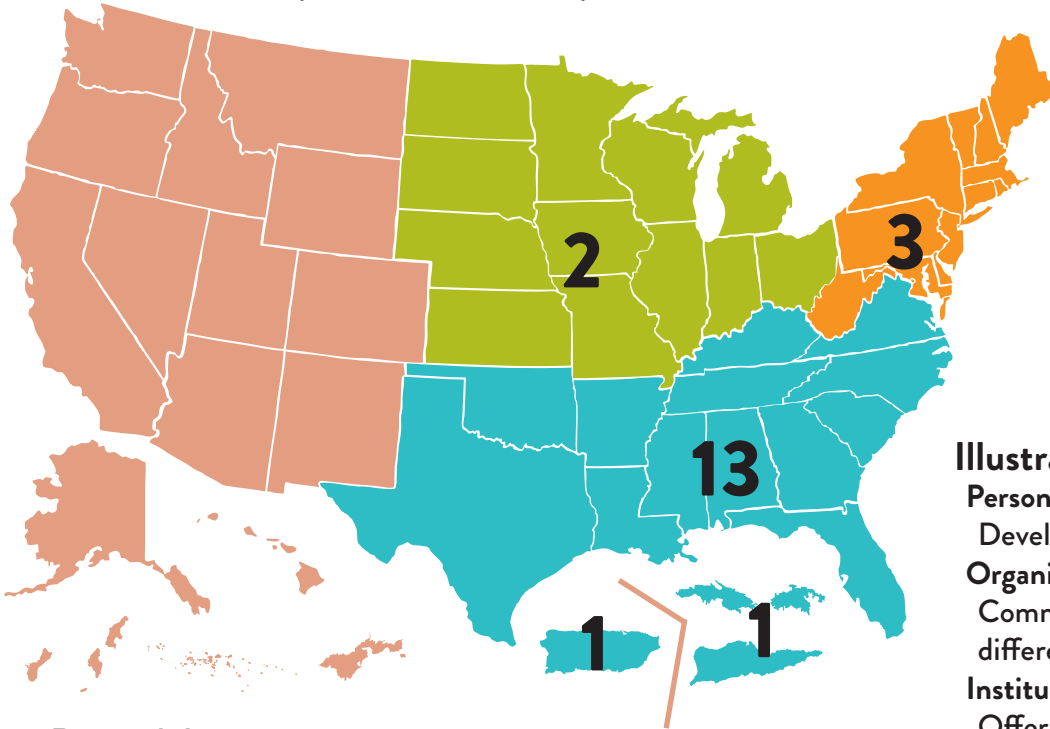
1890 and 1862 Research Collaborations

Purpose: Assess and pursue improvement of research collaborations between 1890 and 1862 Land-Grant Universities

Methods:

Survey of Research Administrative Leaders

- 1890 and 1862 institutions (13 states in the Southern region and 3 states in the Northeast and 2 in the North Central regions, and 1 university each in the territories Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands)
- N=39: 1890 respondents=19, 1862 respondents=20



Research Interviews

- Open ended, discussion-oriented questions
- Conducted over Zoom and audio-recorded
- N=19: 1890 participants=9, 1862 participants=10
- 14 interviewees were connected to 1 other interviewee through collaborative projects
- 8 states represented

Key Findings:

REASONS FOR COLLABORATION

“No one in the world can solve all issues by himself or herself. No institution can solve all issues by itself. So, this is why we have to put our hands together and work in collaboration...” --Interviewee

CHALLENGES TO COLLABORATION

“We are building the plane as we fly it.” --Interviewee

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR PURSUING COLLABORATION

“Know your history and know how it lives every day in your work.” --Interviewee

Illustrative Recommendations from Researchers and Administrators:

Personal/interpersonal Interaction

Develop soft skills, build relationships, and make time for the collaboration.

Organizational Culture

Communicate openly, bring together partners with diverse expertise, and appreciate differences between organizations.

Institutional Structures and Processes

Offer workshops and networking opportunities for convening around common topics, provide trainings on partnering on grants and contracts, and increase support for 1890 capacity.

Takeaways and Next Steps:

Next steps for advancing collaboration should include discussion of what can be done...

- Within and between universities
- Across universities through the regional associations and funders (acknowledging other actors in complex systems)

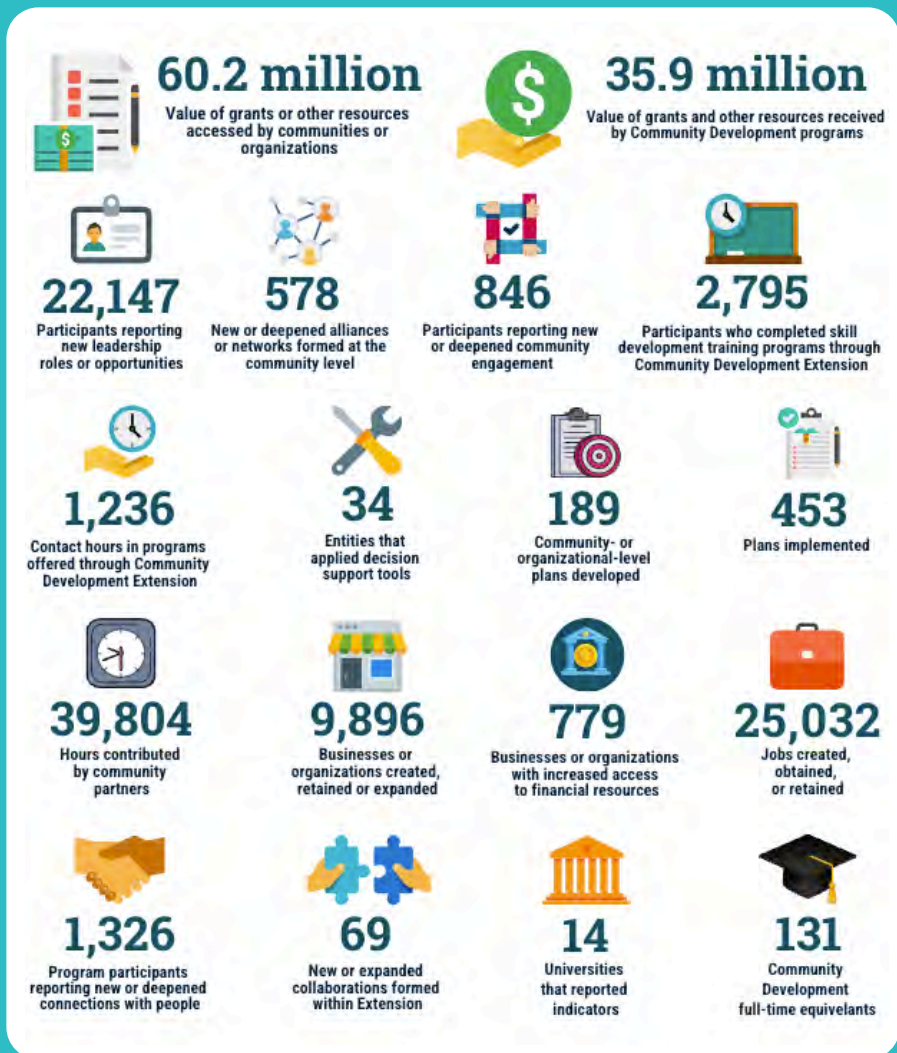

National Efforts to Implement Additional Impact Indicators

The Regional Rural Development Centers (RRDCs) are undertaking an effort to review, update, and expand the set of impact indicators used to capture Extension's Community, Resource, and Economic Development work at the national level. Beginning in 2025, 13 new indicators were added, bringing the total to 20 measurable impact areas. These indicators will strengthen the ability of Land-Grant Universities and Extension professionals to share compelling stories at the local, state, and national levels, highlighting the collective impact of their community and economic development efforts.

Community Development

Through an interdisciplinary approach that integrates theory, practice, and application, Land-Grant Universities are advancing leadership development to address disaster recovery, legislative issues, and community strategic planning. This work strengthens community development by reducing the vulnerability of youth, families, and seniors, while enhancing overall resilience.

Five Year Objectives:

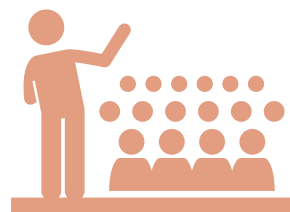
- Increase multidisciplinary and transdisciplinary collaborations and networking efforts among Extension and research professionals addressing heirs' property issues across the Southern Region.

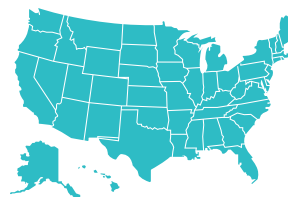

Delta Scholars

The Delta Scholars Program (DSP) is an eight-month undergraduate leadership, community development, and public service initiative.

11 undergraduate students-leaders participated in the 2025 cohort.

Beginning in 2018, there have been 122 Delta Scholars from 37 institutions, including 41 from 9 different Land-Grant Universities



Delta Scholar activities include:

- Two-week summer session with community-university activities
- Delta Regional Forum
- Cultivating Leaders Fall Conference with professional development opportunities
- Capstone Project

The Delta Scholars Program is led by the Mississippi State University Shackouls Honors College in collaboration with other partners in the Delta Directions Consortium, including the Southern Rural Development Center, Brandeis University, University of Mississippi, Rutgers University, Harvard University, and the Community Foundation of Northwest Mississippi.

Delta Regional Forum

The Delta Regional Forum is hosted by the Delta Directions Consortium and the Community Foundation of Northwest Mississippi (CFNM) at the Coahoma County Higher Education Center in Clarksdale, Mississippi. It engages community development practitioners and scholars working in the multistate Delta Region. Organized by CFNM, the Community First Research Center for Wellbeing and Creative Achievement (CREW) at the University of Mississippi, and the Southern Rural Development Center (housed at Mississippi State University), the event was held in Clarksdale, MS, in June 2025. There were 99 participants from 49 different organizations working across sectors.

The June 2025 forum:

- Provided opportunities for development practitioners to share their perspectives on topics ranging from agriculture to education
- Entailed presentations on successful community-university collaboration
- Featured capstone project proposal presentations from 11 Delta Scholars
- Introduced CFNM's Next Generation Leaders Program (sponsored by the Walton Family Foundation)
- Engaged participants through a networking and resources fair

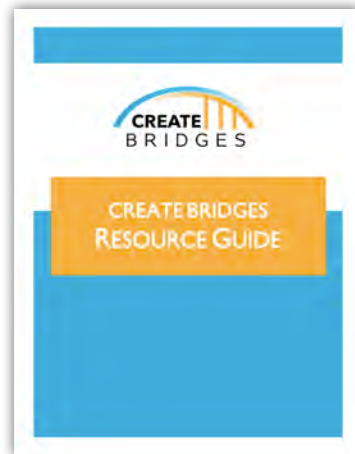

Scholars Junction

In 2023, the Southern Rural Development Center (SRDC) partnered with Mississippi State University Libraries to launch a notable initiative, creating a digital home for SRDC's collection of resources through Scholars Junction. This collaboration opened the door for researchers, educators, and community leaders to access knowledge that drives rural development forward.

With these resources being available online, it is more than an archival system, it is pathway to innovation and shared progress—fostering collaboration and empowering communities with the tools they need to thrive.

Fast forward to 2025, SRDC materials have been downloaded 2,455 times by individuals representing 244 institutions across 111 countries, demonstrating that rural development conversations are resonating on a global scale.

- Relationships between economic livelihood, economic health, and physical health among middle-aged and older people in rural America
- The effects of physical and social isolation on physical, mental, and cognitive health and aging in different rural areas
- Where and how exposures to environmental change and/or climate hazards have affected rural middle-aged and older populations
- Heterogeneity across rural people and places
- Places where rural older adults are thriving
